These are just a few items' that cap off the last year. None of these things are possible without a good, working and happy committee. The state of the Club





















Vice President & Membership

The good news is that after a big drop the previous year, membership numbers have recovered slightly (see following graphs). We are at a level that is probably on the low side of ideal for diving one day a week. The question of what is the ideal membership has been debated on a number of occasions. Too many members and the boat is booked out early and people can't dive. Too few and we become uneconomic.

We have often said that as a club we would like to get the boat out on both Saturday and Sunday but to do this, as well as needing sufficient crew, we would need a diving membership of about 160+, about double the current number. I do think this is a goal that the



club should aspire to although it is a significant increase in current levels and whether it is achievable is questionable. Better utilisation of our boat would ultimately give members more



choice about which day they dive on and would bring down costs for everyone.

Several notable events during the year have significantly helped in numbers, these being the Dolphin Dive open day which resulted in a total of 22 enquiries for October and the posting of the UEC newsletter across a number of Facebook sites such as Dive Buddies [Perth] from February onwards. This can be

seen in the rising trend of nomination dives from January onwards at a time when typically numbers would be dropping off with the colder weather. Unfortunately the boat being out of

action for almost all of June brought numbers back to Earth (or literally land).

Remember it's not just the Membership Secretary or the committee that recruit. We can all do our bit by inviting friends and work colleagues along to try out the boat. Let's see if we can keep the trend moving in the right direction for the next club year.



Treasurer

The accounts show a small profit which is somewhat misleading. This is due to an invoice from Twin Disc who fixed a throttle issue which has yet to be sent to the Club. The expected total of this may be in the vicinity of \$3,000 to \$4,000. This cost, when known, will appear in the financials for next year

Also to appear in the financials next year will be a major cost for the repair to Cape Cruiser's motor which Westrac is currently undertaking. The quote is some \$23,000 but could go higher. Fortunately the Club does have reserves which will cover these costs.



Some interesting financial comparisons from this year to the previous one are:

- Boat dive income up by \$2,400. This was due to more dives plus the \$10 double dive increase
- Membership fees down by \$700 due to reduction in fees from \$170 to \$155
- Nomination dive income up by \$1,000
- Boat Maintenance is \$3,000 less this year however do note the Twin Disc comments above
- Swan Yacht Club pen fees increased \$1,500 this year

It was remiss of me last year for not thanking Clive Cass for organizing the annual Rottnest dive week. His efforts returned \$5,100 to the Club this year so thank you again Clive.

I want to thank the Committee for an enjoyable year and have happily re-nominated to be your Treasurer for next year


Diving

I have to say I've had a ball being Dive Coordinator this year! The depth of our Club's knowledge on the dive sites around Rottnest, as well as up and down the coast, absolutely blows me away... did you know that we have over 150 recorded dive sites on our books?!!





My goal this year was to include some spots we hadn't been to for a while, whilst continuing to visit the favourites, and I believe we achieved this goal. On that note — thank you to the Skipper's for your support. There were a few frantic "I have no idea where this spot is Mel!" phone calls and e-mails along the way — but everyone got behind it, and I think we had more wins than losses in this regard.









Where did we go?

We visited a total of 74 different sites over the course of the year, compared to 70 different sites last year. Looking at the figures, we probably over dived Stragglers a little, but in our defense – it is one of the better, more popular cray hunting spots. Plus, Stragglers has some magnificent country for the non-cray divers to explore and photograph.

How much diving did we do?

A total of 107 divers (UEC, affiliate and nominations) had a total of 703 dives off Cape Cruiser this year, which is up from the previous 12 months (93 divers completed 685 dives last year). Two of these trips were single dives, and two were social night dives.

In terms of non-diving days, Cape Cruiser did undergo some major work this year and (as always) the weather sometimes conspires against our diving plans. Despite this, we still managed 39 different boat trips. This figure was also slightly up from the 36 boat trips last year.

What type of diving did we do?

2014/14 saw our inaugural "Wreck Diving Day" and "Deep(er) Diving Days", as well as the return of Exploratory Diving.



Wreck Diving Days

A fantastic suggestion from Wendy and Chris saw UEC purchase an Annual Pass to dive the Saxon Ranger. We visited this wreck twice, making the most of the purchase.

Whilst the area is fairly silty, the wreck itself was impressive to dive. Given that our visits to the Saxon Ranger took us further south than we would usually venture, we used the opportunity to dive around both Penguin Island and Garden Island on these trips.

Exploratory Diving Days

Given we are the Underwater Explorer's Club of WA – it seems fitting we managed to schedule some exploratory diving this year.

Exploratory Diving days are a difficult to implement, in that no one wants to spend their day diving two disappointing dive sites – yet it is hard to make any guarantees when you're diving the unknown. So to decrease the chances of disappointment, our exploratory dives generally utilised tip-offs from outside the Club's knowledge base.

With that in mind, we held two Exploratory Diving days this year – the first visited site is now named "Donotdiveagain" (like I say – we don't always get it right!)

Our second Exploratory Diving Day saw us head to Easter Lump, which the Club had only dived once — the time it was discovered. Second dive of the day was a new site found by the group during the Rottnest Week — Geordie Lumps. We had favourable reports on both sites.



Deep(er) Diving Days

The site we visited for our Deep(er) Day was Bluey's Ridge – which got down to 30m. We were blessed with fantastic conditions and visibility, and a highlight of the day was spotting a good-sized Grey Nurse shark. We'll look to hold another Deep(er) Diving day in the coming 12 months.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank Chris and Wendy for their support and guidance on the Exploratory, Wreck and Deep(er) Diving Days... I think those who participated on any of these days would agree – they were a lot of fun.

Carl the Cray Whisperer's Secret Spot Dives

By now most will know Carl – he is legendary at sniffing out and catching crayfish, and his days were extremely popular (the boat was booked to capacity all three times he skippered his cray fishing days).

And finally, THANK YOU, thank you all for your continued support, generosity and enthusiasm. Ours is a great club, it is only through your support that we remain so.





Safety & Training

Another successful year at UEC from the safety side of things with not much to report and that's probably a good thing. With only a couple of incidents and none resulting in personal injury it's been a safe year. This is mainly due, I believe, to the way our skippers and dive officers go about their business. I am very impressed with the way our crews are looking after us all and with some newcomers to the crew list I expect this to continue.

I already have some names of members who wish to undertake training in the Skipper and DO roles on Cape Crusader in the near future. We are always looking for new crew so if you like the sound of it let me know. Recent changes to the Dept of Transport regulations mean that DO's do not have to have a recreational skippers ticket any more.



Just a little reminder about our own personal diving skills. On your open water course (for some that may be a stretch to remember) we were all taught how to manage emergencies such as losing a reg or a mask and how to remove a BCD underwater and replace it.

Now the BIG question??? When was the last time you practised these skills. I know "it will never happen" but that's what safety is all about. So next time you are in shallow water with a few minutes and a few bar of air to spare have a go. Let your buddy know and remove your mask, share an air source. Even inflate a safety sausage without getting tangled in the cords.

UEC Rotto Annual Holiday February 2015

With the boat loaded up with twelve divers all looking forward to a week of diving, eating, drinking and generally having fun we set off down the river. The crossing was uneventful until we got close Rottnest where witnessed the annual spectacle of the Rottnest swim flotilla. Geoff carefully picked his way through the line of boats and swimmers and we cruised into the vibrant Thompson Bay.



After dropping off Clive and

Zita to pick up the keys, the rest of us cruised around to Geordie Bay. After 30 minutes of humping bags and Eskies we were in and the Rotto week had begun in earnest.

Saturday night kicked off with the traditional group dinner conjured up by Liz, Chris and others and the next day's plan was formed. The traditional salute to Huey was performed by Bob on the balcony and then we got stuck in to the Spag Bol.



With a weather forecast of rapidly increasing wind we opted for a 7am start much to the chagrin of those who prefer their beds at that time.

Day One - Sunday

Geoff and Clive had the boat on the jetty at 7am and with only six divers we set off. A brief delay while Clive wrapped his Craypot around the rudder saw most of our early start evaporate but although it was windy the swell was not bad so we headed for Flat Top. This ranks as my own personal favourite

dive on Rottnest and it didn't disappoint. Stunning viz made it a perfect start to the week. While the Cray's eluded us all the photographers had a field day.

With an increasing SE wind we decided to head inshore for some shelter. For the second dive we opted for the City of York wreck. Another beautiful dive with stunning scenery of gullies, caves and swim thru's. Yet again the Cray's won the day but a beautiful dive had by all. Nobody found the wreck but I suspect some of the caves we swam through were underneath it.

Day Two - Monday

With the weather steadily improving we decided to try out Kerry's caverns. This was an interesting dive site with lots of smallish caves & long tunnels including one that Adrian and I ventured into which was just swarming with the little buggers (and most of them were little). As we had only got 200 bar to start with from the Rottnest bike rental the dive was going to be limited. The Cray drought ended with about 12 Cray's bagged for the day and lots of prawns returned to fight again.



With the wind picking up we headed again for the shelter of the island and City of York outer reef. Initially the country was pretty average but after a while we found some nice gullies, caves and swim thru's.

Day Three - Tuesday

With Steve as Skipper there was a last minute change of plan with a trial of a new dive site called Marjorie's sump holes. As most wanted to dive the west end as the forecast was promising but to satisfy the crayfisher's we did one at this site on steves recommendation. Geoff, Adrian, Mak, Bob, Zita and Clive jumped in and came back with glowing reports. We then took a trip round to Martins Arches on the west end but decided the swell was too high. Geoff convinced all to go back



to do Marjorie's again but unfortunately we missed the mark and most of us didn't find too much. Lots of undersized Cray's caught with a few keepers.

With the wind picking up and a desire for more Cray's we went to Geordie Bay Caves. A nice but not spectacular dive with a few Cray's in the bag.

Day Four - Wednesday

The forecast was near perfect so we decided to try the West End again. First stop was Anders Meander but after the peg had dropped the consensus was it was too rough.

We decided to move into Eagle Bay entrance (outer Cathedral Rocks reef) and had a second go. It was a long swim to the reef but for those who made it it was a very nice dive.



Lots of gullies, slabs, holes and caves, some packed with Crayfish. Adrian and I found a nice flat cave about 10m across and 1m high with a few Cray's hanging around which kept us entertained for 10 minutes.



As we were already at Cathedral Rocks and the conditions were looking great Denis convinced us to go for the holy grail of The Cathedral itself. We dropped the peg as close as we could and set off.

Well what a dive. Words cannot express how beautiful a dive site this is. Lots of caves of varying sizes, tunnels, shafts of light and enough Cray's to sink a battleship but as it is sanctuary zone all safe from our eager eyes. Adrian and I pushed on over the break to find the elusive Cathedral. We don't know if we found

it but we found a cavern that was well worthy of the description. It was so big that my LED couldn't reach the sides. Adrian's description of an aircraft hanger was pretty apt. It was very dark with just a bright shaft of light at the end we entered which looked very much like the altar.

At the back of the cavern a tunnel disappeared off into the distance which I attempted to go down but after getting stuck I decided retreat was the best option. We reluctantly left as air and time were against us and headed back to the boat.

Wednesday night saw us down at the Rottnest Lodge for what is becoming the traditional quiz night. This is something that we usually clean up at but this particular night after some heckling of the compere for her somewhat amusing pronunciation of certain words we mysteriously ended up in 2nd or 3rd place. I guess we kind of asked for it but we was robbed.

Day 5 – Thursday

With the wind picking up and coming from West to North West we decided to head around to the Crystal Caves area of Rottnest. The diving was superb and the Crays were jumping in the bags so we ended up doing both dives in the same location.

Day 6 – Friday

With the weather deteriorating and a strong southerly wind it was down to a core of four dedicated divers to do the last day of the week. So with Dennis at the helm and Steve Day as DO Mike, Mak, Adrian and Geoff headed for a site that is rarely dived – Maree's Aquarium. This is tucked



into the North of the island just west of Parakeet Bay and in the conditions was probably the most sheltered dive we could have found. With a blustery wind Dennis was forced to drop anchor some way off the reef so we had a bit of a swim.

Mak and I swam over the reef and spent about 25 minutes looking for the cave. It was only when we about turned and headed back over the reef to head back to the boat that we found a hole and on diving in there it was. Members were allowed to submit up to 3 photos each, with the top 7 photos going on display. We received a total of 24 entries from 9 individuals – all of exceptional quality.


Congratulations to everyone who entered this competition... the talent we have in our Club never ceases to amaze.



Wrecks May Yield More Information

The sailing ships Batavia and Zeewyck will be reconstructed on a drawing board from information gained by an expedition to the wrecks off the Abrolhos Islands.

Twelve members of the Underwater Explorers' club, who live in the metropolitan area, will form part of the expedition team. They will spend about five days, weather permitting, measuring the wrecks.

The party will leave Perth on August 25.

Mr K. Kennedy, who is in charge of the club's members and museum officials would dive.

The U.E.C. would re-

dive.

The U.E.C. would receive a donation from the museum, depending on results achieved by members.

It would cost member about \$80 each.

The Batavia was lying in 16-24ft of water and the Zeewyck might be in up to 30ft.

The area was open to bad weather, which might stop the work. It was hoped, by measuring from point to point around the wrecks, to draw comprehensive plans.

Reconstructing the wrecks had to be done before any relics were moved.

Eventually a wreck might be remodelled on land. The Batavia could never be pulled up. It had been battered and flattened.

If items, such as a spar, were pulled up they could be preserved and put in their place as shown on the plan.

The locations of the wrecks were not well known. Local fishermen were good custodians against vandals or treature hursely.

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Silver coins had been
picked up from the Batavia. Her cargo list showed she had been carrying
gold and silver coins.

The wrecks belonged to
the museum and people
could be prosecuted for
interfering with them.

If bad weather stopped
underwater work, members would try to prove
a theory which they were
keeping secret.

It would mean excavation work on an island
and it could result in the
recovery of skeletons,
swords and other items.
