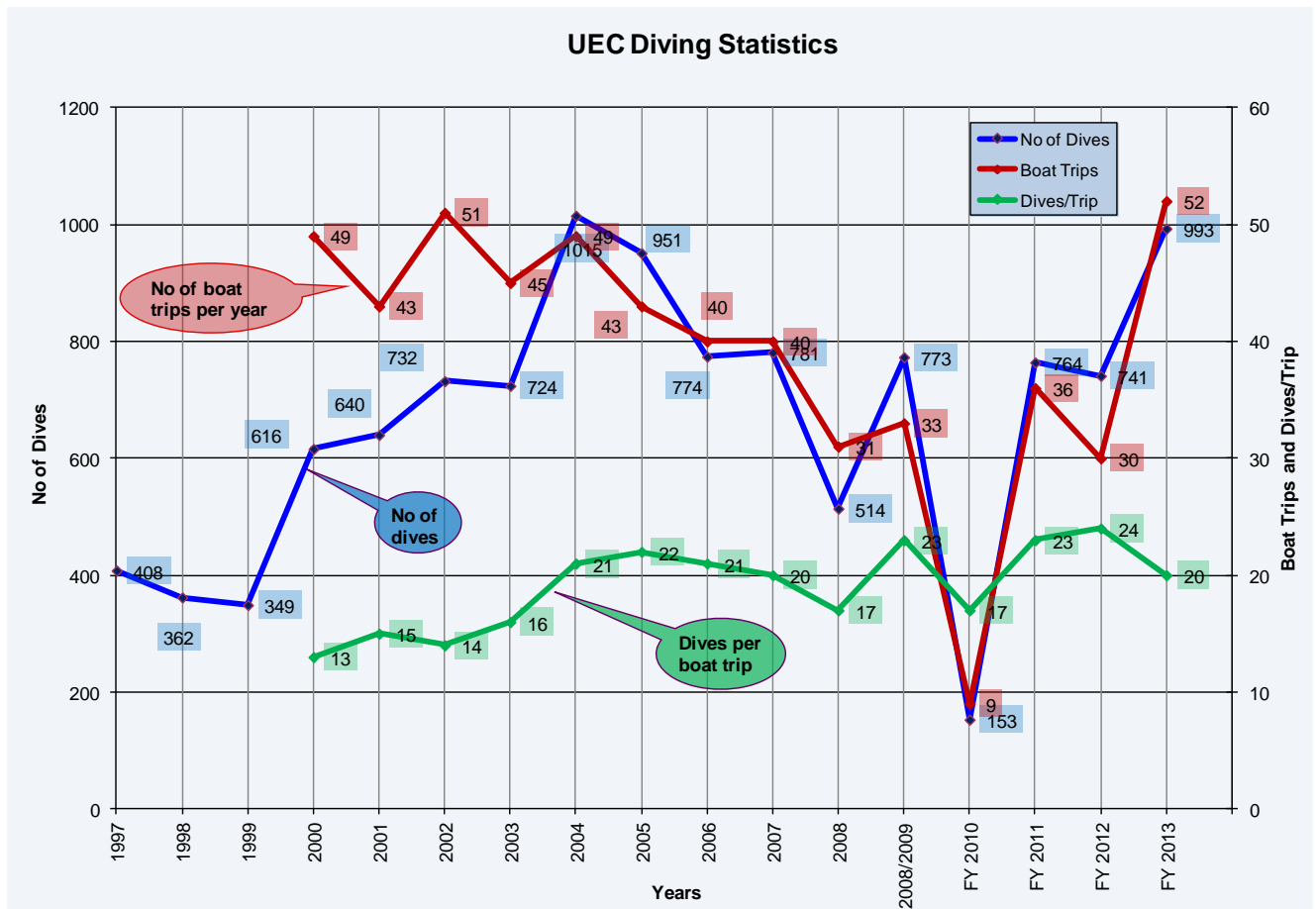

Presidents Report

After receiving the tap on the shoulder from Bruce, I took on the role with a degree of trepidation. As a relatively recent member of the club I was very aware of the history, depth of knowledge and experience, both in the committee, and the membership in general. This has been both a blessing and a curse, as on one hand it has been great to have that experience to call on, but on the other it has been a challenge to keep everyone happy. As they say you can "... you can't please all of the people all of the time".

Overall it has been a very successful year for the club. We have seen membership grow, boat trips hit a record at 52 and the number of dives almost break the 1000 mark, the highest since 2004. Thanks in part to the high boat utilisation we have seen the club start to build a secure financial base after repaying the boat loans. I would like to think the new committee can start looking at all the boat improvements we have talked about such as seating layout and an upper deck canopy.



There have been a few other achievements I think worth mentioning:

Constitution

After several years of talking about updating the constitution to bring it into line with the model rules in the Associations Act I finally decided to get it done. Credit for the majority of the work must go to previous committee members including Clive and Amanda. All that was required from me was a tidy up the previous work, send out the draft, incorporate the feedback, send out the final version, organise the special resolution meeting in May and submit the final document to the Department of Commerce. The new constitution is now in place.

By Laws

One of the results of updating the constitution was to highlight the need for a separate

document to capture the rules and guidelines developed over the years into one document that can be easily updated. I am aware that we are here to have fun and rules generally don't go with fun but the number one priority has to be safety. The recent tragic death of a recreational diver off Rottneest is a reminder of the dangers of our sport. It will be no fun for anyone, divers, crew or family, if one of our friends and colleagues is hurt while diving. Most of the rules and guidelines in the By Laws have been in place in the club for some time but never been properly documented outside of meeting minutes. The first edition of this has now been issued and has already generated some healthy debate. Knowing how passionate our members can be I'm sure there will be more.

BBQ Fund Raising

I would like to make a special mention to all those who contributed to the fund for the BBQ with a special thanks to Bob & Zita, Paul Burns and Dave Kenny for their generous donations. Thanks also to Chris and Wendy for organising it all and the boat committee for buying and fitting it.

Swan River Trust Grant

A special thanks to Tracy Burns (nee Hagen) who, with help from Pat Swallow and Tom Bassett, managed to secure a \$5000 grant from the Swan River Trust for providing information that will go towards creating a river dive trail. While mentioning Tracy we must also pass on our congratulations to the UEC marriage of the year between Tracy and Paul.



I have decided that it's time to stand down so I would like to thank the committee and the membership for giving me the opportunity to be President and I wish the club all the success for the future.

Treasurer's Report

BACKGROUND

I attended the UEC General Meeting in January. At that meeting Wendy Hutchison called for

a volunteer to take on her Treasurer's role until the next AGM. I called Wendy the next day to offer my services.....the rest...as they say.... is history!

TREASURER'S HANDOVER – NEW ACCOUNTING SOFTWARE PACKAGE

In early April I spent several hours with Wendy in an attempt to 'learn' the bookkeeping system that Wendy was using. I came away full with admiration for her and the previous Treasurer as the system in use was based on Excel spread sheets! It was my initial intentions to continue with this system whilst I filled in as Treasurer and maybe implement a proper accounting software package for 2013-2014 should I & the Members wanted me to continue in the role.



After much deliberation I decided that an immediate implementation of a full blown software package would be best for the Club and my sanity! With the knowledge and assent of our President & outgoing Treasurer and without cost to the Club or me, I implemented an Accounting package as at 1st April 2013. It is the same package that we use in our Caravan Business. The software company has given written permission for the Club to continue using the software, should they desire, at no charge when I retire.

RE-INTRODUCTION OF BALANCE SHEET

I instigated the following with due regard to the matching principle of accountancy and to clearly show the activities of the Club:

- Dives in Lieu owed as at 31st March 2013 were monetised at the current dive cost [\$60]. Any dives accumulated or taken as from April are now shown separately in the Profit & Loss Statement.
- Costs paid & deposits received prior to 1st July 2013 for trips taking place after July 1st 2013 are now shown on the Balance Sheet.
- Costs paid & deposits received before 1st July 2012 for trips undertaken after 1st July 2012 have been posted to shareholder's Funds and are included in this year's Profit & Loss Statement.
- Other costs paid prior to 1st July 2012 that were for the Club's activities after 1st July 2012 such as SYC pen fees were likewise posted to shareholder's Funds and are included in this year's Profit & Loss Statement
- Bank Reconciliations are performed at least monthly and can be reprinted as and when required
- Club activities are segregated in the Profit & Loss Statement to show the profits for each one
- The reintroduction of the Cape Cruiser and other depreciable assets purchased prior to 1st July 2010 into the Balance Sheet of the Club
- Catch up depreciation of the Cape Cruiser and other depreciable assets introduced into the Profit & Loss Statement.

SYC SOCIAL SUBSCRIPTIONS

Thanks to the SYC office who agreed to my request to have them invoice & collect their subscriptions directly to UECWA members. This will reduce significantly the workload of the UEC Treasurer

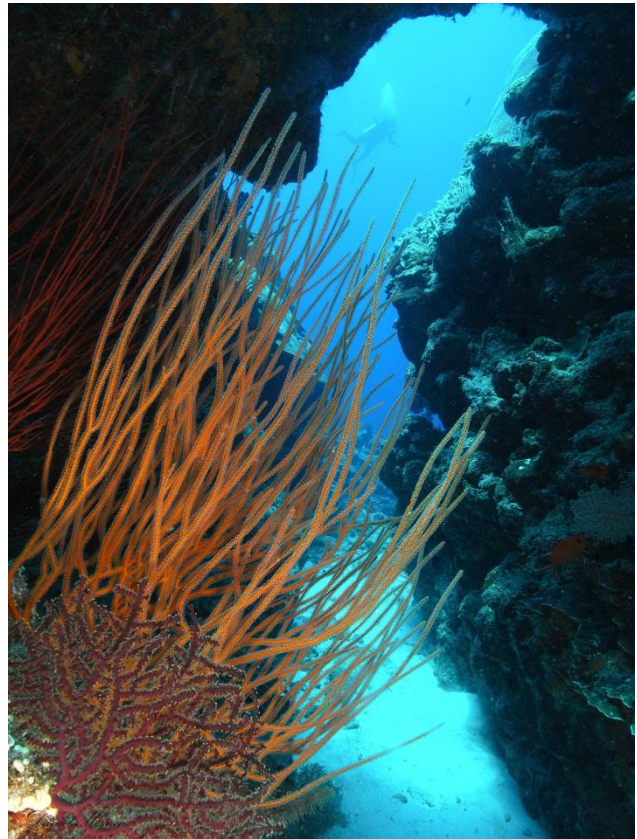
ANNUAL PROFIT

Including Depreciation [\$19,145] the Club recorded a modest profit this year of approximately \$15,000. This includes the windfall gain of \$5,000 from the Swan River Trust so the profit is actually \$10,000 from 'normal' activities

CONTINGENCIES

The Club recorded a modest profit this year which has added to the cash reserves.

In my view it is imperative that the incoming Committee arrive at and quarantine a contingency amount in the short term for major items such as motor and gearbox. The Club should also plan for the eventual funding of a replacement for Cape Cruiser.



NOMINATION

As it did take a good deal of time to implement the new software if the Members will have me I want to continue as your Treasurer next year.

Membership Secretary's Report

It is good to note that the club's membership and diving activities have further increased over the past year.

Boat trips grew from 30 in FY2012 to 52 in FY2013 and we had 141 individual divers, compared to 108 the previous year. At the end of the FY13 membership year we had 125 members, compared with 122 members at the end of the FY12 year.

Over the year, 47 people came out on the boat and completed a nomination



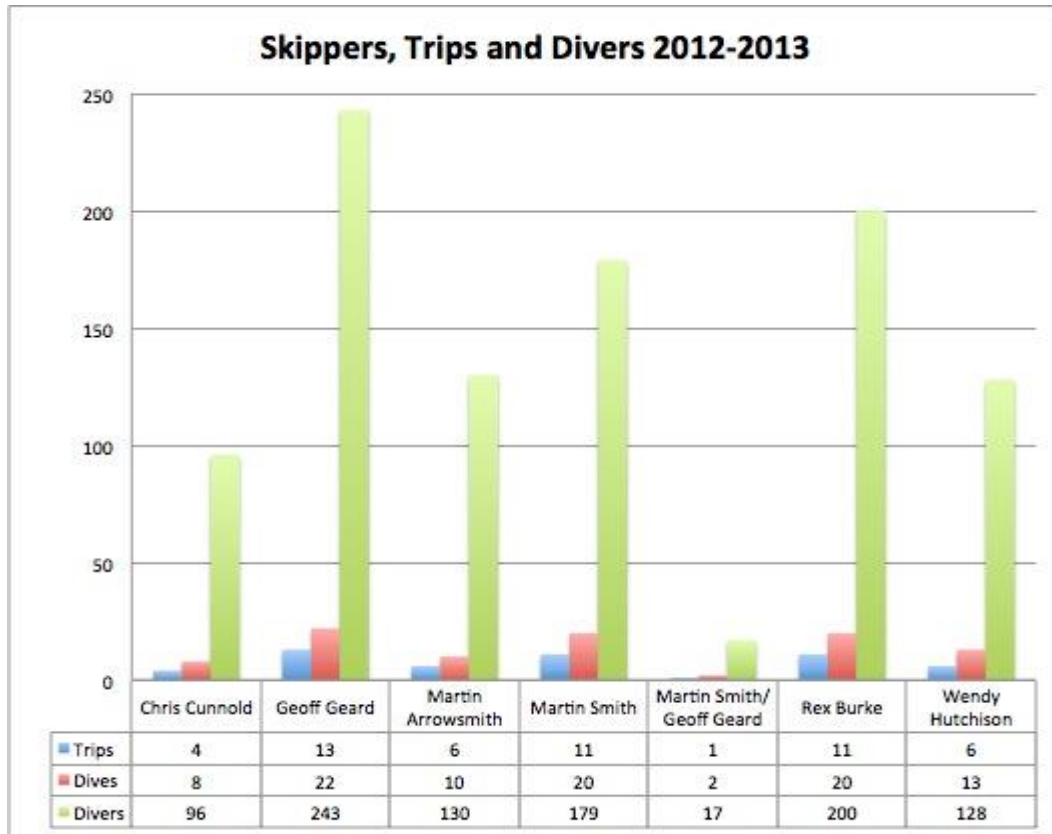
dive. From that we had 27 people who joined as diving members.

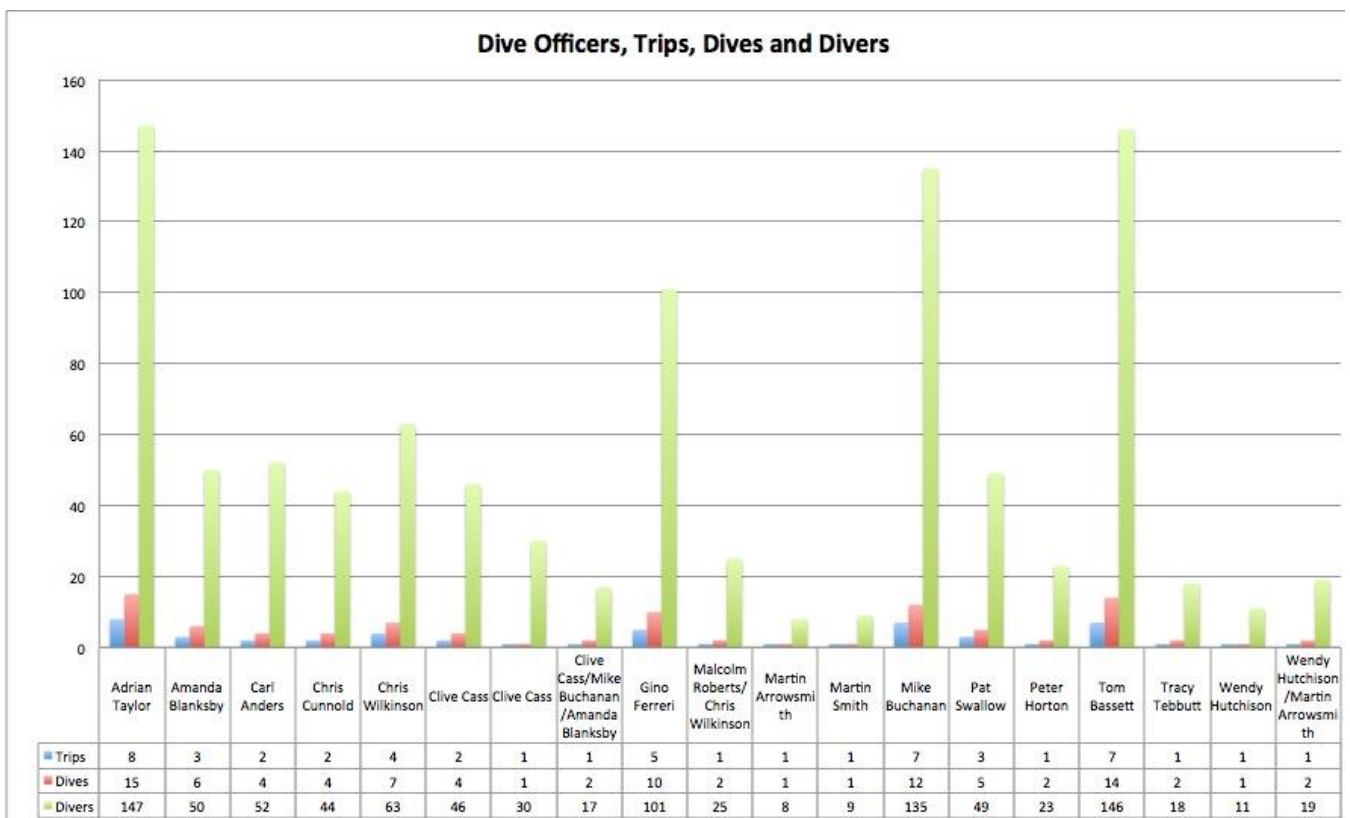

Top Dive Officer went to Adrian Taylor with 8 trips followed closely by Mike Buchanan with 7-1/2 and Tom Bassett on 7.



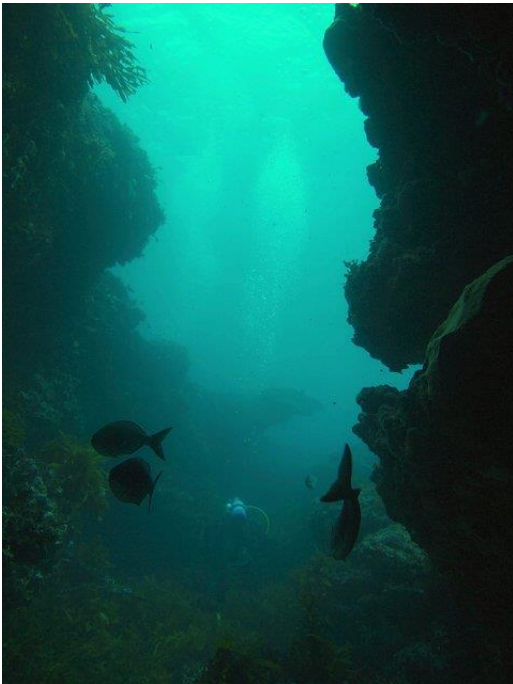
Boat Officers Report

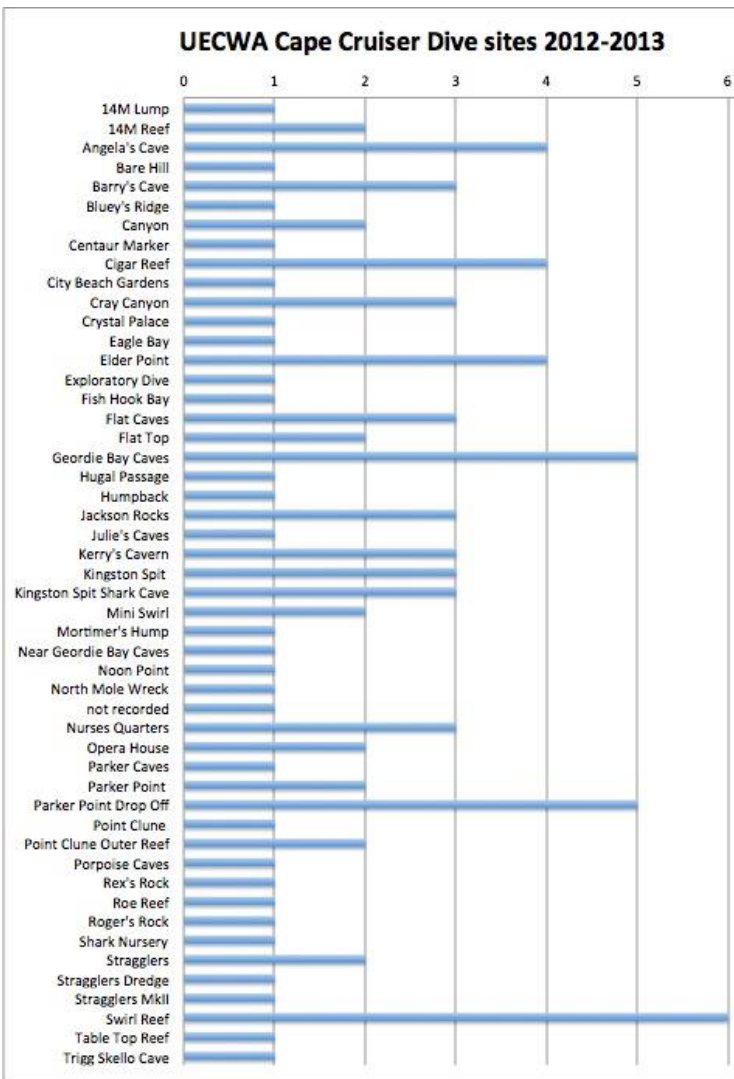
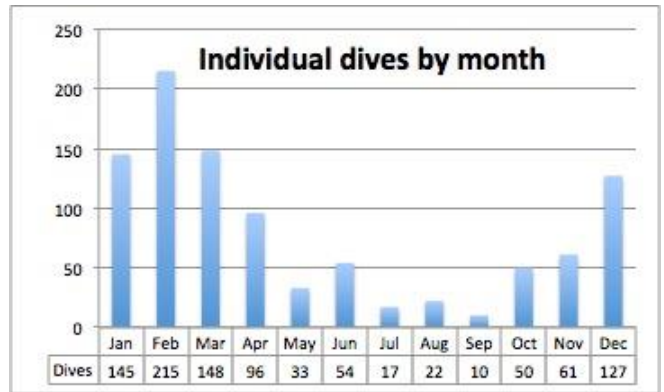

Exploring also continued with a some great new sites added to the list

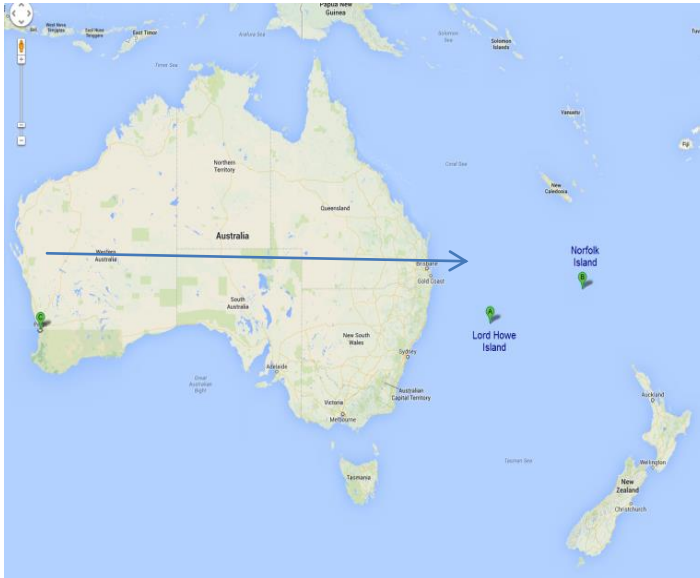
Lord Howe Island UECWA dive trip March 2013 (organised by Jo Bull)

When Jo first proposed The Lord Howe Island Dive trip we jumped at the chance, as we haven't been on a "bad" club trip ever, we then asked ourselves where is Lord Howe exactly ? so let's start there !

Here tis !



A bit of background – because its so darn interesting !

Some facts about Lord Howe :

- Part of the state of NSW, self-governed (Lord Howe Board)
- 350 Permanent residents, maximum tourists 400.
- World Heritage Listed in 1982 and best of all declared a marine park in 1998
- The island is 10kmlong between 300m and 2km wide.
- The highest point is Mt Gower (875m)

Lord Howe Island group contains 28 islands, including the notable Balls Pyramid and the Admiralty group to the north. The first reported sighting of the island was from the armed tender HMS Supply by Lieutenant Lidgbird Ball. The ship was part of the first fleet and on its way to Botany Bay with 19 convicts, on the return journey Ball stopped again and claimed it as British possession. It appears prior to this the island was uninhabited and unknown to the nearby south pacific Polynesian people.



It subsequently became the provision port for whaling, and permanently settled in 1834. When whaling declined the export of the endemic Kentia Palms began in 1880's. Kentia exports were the islands main bread and butter but this has now cessed and the last nursery closed while we were there.



Most of the island is virtually untouched forest with plants and animals found nowhere else in the world, the island is 70% protected by a Permanent Park Preserve.

The surrounding waters are a protected region designated the Lord Howe Island Marine Park. This means that from shore to 12 nautical miles its heavily protected !



Reef habitats are particularly diverse and range from true coral reefs made of limestone in sheltered lagoonal habitats to complex rocky reefs in wave exposed habitats and mid and outer shelf and slope environments. Lord Howe Island is the world's southernmost locality with a true coral reef community and also has the only fringing coral reef lagoon in NSW

The East Australian Current (EAC) dominates ocean circulation around the Lord Howe Island. This current first flows from the north along the eastern seaboard of the Australian continent and then swings offshore in pulses from about September to December before either returning north or dissipating after shedding warm core eddies.



The trip – First impressions

We arrived on various planes from the mainland on a Dash 8 Prop plane (little and loud!), the landing strip is on the narrowest part of the island so landing and departing quite hair raising. Off we got with our 14kg (yikes!) of luggage plus 7kg(yeah right!) of hand luggage (a tough limit when diving).



We stayed at Ocean View Apartments (self catering owned by one of the historic families, immaculate and super helpful and friendly). We arrived to these views and if you didn't gasp there was something wrong, this island is magic. One odd first impression was there was no litter, absolutely none, they recycle a tremendous amount as they have too, wow !!!

Shorts and tshirt weather for sure ! We headed down to a shack on the beach to set up our gear. We dived with **Prodiver** (one of two dive shops on the island) Jo had previously completed her dive interm here!

Paul and I arrived at the local café for lunch and were greeted with a fresh, locally, hand caught, no quilt Tuna coming through the door. The chef said wait 5 minutes and we'll have it ready for you for lunch, Sure said we, and enjoyed fresh sashimi Tuna (YUMM!)



Next was the self catering ... apparently the place to go was Joys. As you can imagine the food was pretty pricey but considering the transport and small economy pretty reasonable. Some of us hired bikes, this and walking are the main modes of transport, as you can imagine some of us hadnt been on a bike for a while so it was



really quite comical.



The Diving



Kitting up chaos, as is usual for a first dive, they got

us sorted pretty quick, the go was to wade in



with you gear and climb onto the moored boat, but they were happy to help (but it wasn't

Indonesia !). We dived the Lagoon the first day to get acclimatised on their very little boat,



luckily we were all friends. Aaron was our dive guide for the trip and I think now runs the operation. The lagoon dives weren't amazing but good easy dives especially when the weathers up (good to have that option) On this dive our first encounter with the reef shark like, puppy like Galapagos shark.



Subsequent dives included the many dives at The Admiralties, including Malabar slide and the Arch. And offshore of the North of Island, with the swells and cliffs pretty much inaccessible but by boat.



We also enjoyed the Ocean View fishing boat for a lot of the time which was quite generous for space and handled the swells a lot better. What we sadly missed, due to the relentless swell and current, were the Balls Pyramid dives (something to do next time!)

I found the dives to be very reminiscent of Albany, very structural, large granite boulders sweeping sands but with an odd mix of tropical species (maybe somewhat Abrolhos's like?) Now no need to say too much more other than go there and try it out !



Other things to do on Lord Howe :

- Climb Mount Gower to see the mist forest (and the view!)
- Snorkel with Turtles at settlers beach
- Lawn bowls with the locals



- Fish feeding at Neds Beach

This is a spectacular place, and I highly recommend you get there, it is suitable for divers and non-divers ! Thanks for organising Jo !! We had the best time.



Rottnest Channel Swim February 2013

A monster effort for the UEC swim team, a lot of good summer diving was sacrificed for training for the Rottnest Channel Swim. Including many laps between Coogee and Ammo Jetty and black line following in the swimming pools of Perth. In the lead up, the group competed in many of the beach swims including the Rottnest Swim Thru (1 mile), Australia Day Swim thru (2 km), Perth Swim Thru (Mathilda Bay) 4km, Busselton Jetty 3.6km.
